A vision for mission

Following two congregational meetings during 2014, the PCC has put together the beginnings of a mission plan for the Parish of William Temple.

Central to our vision is baptism. We are fortunate to welcome many families in to the church each year through baptismal services and the font is at the heart of our magnificent church building.

Baptism is the start of a journey and we hope that through baptism, families will feel welcome in our church community. We long to belong and we hope that everyone who connects with our parish church will also sense that belonging.

As we celebrate our growing Christian family we give thanks for the opportunity to journey together in faith. Belonging is part of our believing.

Our vision for mission encourages this Belonging before Believing.

This leaflet outlines some of the ideas from the congregational discussions which will become part of our Mission Action Plan for the next five years. The ideas presented here all come from the congregational and PCC discussions and are brought together here with our 50th anniversary celebration programme for 2015.

1. Working with Baptismal Families

William Temple: Our Heritage What's it all about?



A Vision for Mission in the Parish of William Temple

Heritage is something we care about from the past.

As the Church building of William Temple enters its 50th year there are probably lots of things we care about from the last 50 years that we wish could make a record of to show future generations. Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) is set up to support people to explore, celebrate and document heritage in a way that's meaningful.

Under the "Our Heritage" programme we could make an application to develop a heritage project over the next 18 months or so



We can apply for £10,000 - £100,000

We must be able to show that there is wide support and enthusiasm for the project.

What kind of things will be expected to do?

That's really up to the church community, through the PCC, to decide. We might want to collect artefacts from the last 50 years and catalogue them or make them into an exhibition that local people can come and see — for example, photos, press cuttings, magazine articles, old clothing/vestments.

We might run a series of community events where people can swap stories and memories. This could be a film.

What will we be monitored on?

We will be measured on some of the following outcomes:

Heritage will better managed and in better condition – if we built in funding towards a new heating system we would achieve these outcomes

Heritage will be better explained and better identified — by documenting history or stories that aren't currently easily accessible, we will ensure that these two outcomes are achieved (for example, using online and digital methods that are more readily accessed by young people ensures our heritage is well explained and identifiable to a new generation)

People must develop skills, learn about heritage – we could achieve this through community activities

People must volunteer time, change their attitudes and have an enjoyable experience – we already do this through coffee mornings, fairs, and the Heritage Open day we held in September.

In the community more people must be engaged, it must be a better place to live and work — if we are inviting people in, they must be engaged with us and with more opportunities to get involved and so won't this be a better place to live and work?

Can we get help to do all this?

We can build into the bid some worker time to help keep the project on track and liaise with HLF but we must be able to show that the project is being driven by us - local people
